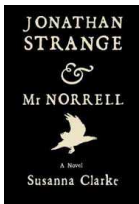

By Holly Black

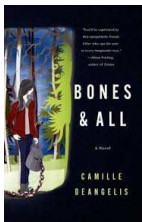

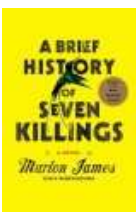

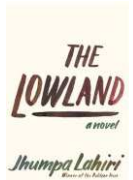

A Little Life

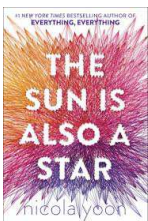

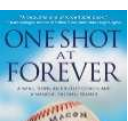
The Sun is Also a Star

Carla is allergic to the world. She has not left her house in seventeen years. The only people she ever sees are her mom and her nurse.



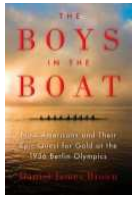
